

Neighbourhood plan

Barcombe is a small village located in East Sussex, England, situated approximately 6 miles north of Lewes and 12 miles east of Brighton. The village is home to around 1,600 residents and covers an area of roughly 3 square miles.

Barcombe has a rich history, with evidence of settlement in the area dating back to the Bronze Age. The village is surrounded by beautiful countryside, with the River Ouse running through it, and the South Downs National Park located just to the south. This makes it a popular destination for outdoor enthusiasts, with plenty of walking and cycling routes to explore.

Barcombe is home to a number of local amenities, including a primary school, village hall, post office, public house and local shop.

The Barcombe Neighbourhood Plan has been designed to determine the nature of preservation and development initiatives in the Parish during the period from 2025 to 2040. In doing so Barcombe is taking the opportunity presented to communities to have more control over development in their areas under the Localism Act [2011] and the related Neighbourhood Plan Regulations [2012].

Neighbourhood Plans are a government initiative aimed at local public participation in the planning process, and, once adopted, the policies contained in a Neighbourhood Plan become an integral part of the planning

considerations related to development in that area. However, it must be noted that a Neighbourhood Plan cannot contradict or over-ride national or district Council planning policy, and so is intended to add detail and reflect local knowledge.

Following an application by Barcombe Parish Council [BPC] in January 2015, Lewes District Council [Lewes DC] designated the whole of the parish of Barcombe as a Neighbourhood Area.

A previous initiative to produce a Neighbourhood Plan was started by Barcombe Parish Council in 2015. Although significant amount of valuable work was done on the NP at the time, work was stopped in 2018 for a number of good reasons. However, on the basis that Neighbourhood Plans is an essential element of the planning process with new legislation, in 2022 the Parish Council decided to restart the production of their Neighbourhood Plan.

A small Steering Group was set up to consider the options available to the Parish Council and whether a new Neighbourhood Plan would be a valuable tool for use by the village in determining its future requirements. The Parish Council signed off on the Terms of Reference of the new Steering Group early in 2023.

At the start there were a number of changes to legislation that required consideration, not least the Governments Levelling-up and Regeneration Bill, the changes to the National Planning Policy Framework and Lewes District Council's new Local Plan.

Why Produce a Neighbourhood Plan for Barcombe?

Producing a NP for Barcombe can bring numerous benefits and advantages. Here are some of the key reasons for the Parish Council undertaking this project:

Community Engagement: Developing a NP involves active participation and engagement from the local community.
